From the Pastor—

From "Songs of Justice and Peace" from the Lutheran Deaconess Association "Break my Heart." Please break my heart O God With what breaks your heart O God Please break my heart.

With this early Spring, coupled with a winter that did not seem like winter, it is such a temptation to plant our gardens early. Frost here and there can be discouraging—but it just seems as if we could put out some stuff—especially if it is not too expensive. I planted some cilantro seeds last week—that were left over from last year. I planted them up close to the house—where they might have a chance even if we have more frost. They had been in the garage all winter. I am never sure if seeds last that long or not. It really does not matter much. If they grow, fine. I will have lovely early cilantro. I love cilantro! If they do not grow, I was going to throw them out anyway. It will not break my heart.

Sometimes I think we try new ministries in the same way as my cilantro seeds. We are willing to give them a try if they are not too expensive. We might even give them extra protection against what could hurt them. If they work, fine. If not it did not cost us that much anyway. It will not break our hearts.

So many opportunities for ministry are presenting themselves to us right now. Cheryl has been coming to worship. She is losing her hearing. We have Jane Anello, who can interpret worship in sign language. Really using Jane is not too expensive. She was here anyway. But what if having Cheryl here costs more? What if it costs me learning to speak more slowly so that an interpreter can keep up? What it if costs us, the members of Our Saviour, learning sign language as well? Why would a person want to join a church where they can only communicate with one person? What if we have to hire an interpreter? Are we willing to be a part of a ministry tha6t is expensive? Will our hearts be broken for the sake of those who cannot hear?

Gerry Presser brought dinner down to the Rescue Mission a few months ago. I went with her. Gerry is a good and capable cook. It does not cost much to go along with her. Gerry has this idea that Our Saviour could provide meals at the Rescue Mission once a month. This is a more expensive ministry. It involves commitment from us. Are we willing to have our hearts broken for the sake of people we do not know?

Sandy Lenahan is excited about the Malaria Campaign. We can all give something to end Malaria—but will our hearts be broken like Sandy's is so that we might give of ourselves in ways that can really change the world?

I am influenced by the hymn quoted above. We can ask God to break our hearts for the sake of others. We can ask God to break our hearts because we have shouted back and forth to one another again and again this Easter season, "Christ is Risen!" "Christ is Risen Indeed!" We know that the God who breaks our hearts has be power to raise Jesus from the dead once our hearts are broken. — Pastor Anita

Alcoholics Anonymous® a fellowship of men and women who share their experience, strength and hope with each other that they may solve their common problem and help others to recover from alcoholism holds regular meetings in our facility.

Seeds of Hope, a local food pantry is a collaborative effort of First Presbyterian—Utica, Our Saviour, New Hartford Presbyterian, and New Hartford United Methodist churches.

Hope House, a safe haven providing meals and other services in Utica is supported by volunteers from our congregation.

SPAN, a resource program for individual nurses who are affected by an alcohol or drug-related problem or related mental health problem meets weekly in our building.

HIV dinners which provide dinner and a place for people who are HIV positive to network and learn about the latest trends in treatment are held each month at our church.

- Teach people how to protect themselves from the mosquitoes that spread malaria, recognize symptoms and seek treatment;
- Distribute insecticide-treated mosquito nets and provide training on their use;
- Provide preventative medication to protect pregnant women and their babies; and
- Support water treatment projects to control the environments where mosquitoes breed.

The ELCA Malaria Campaign has committed to raise \$15 million as we strive to "Make Malaria History" - ending Malaria deaths by 2015! You can play a role to help us achieve this goal. Join us in the fight against malaria. Just \$10 is enough to provide a family with an insecticide-treated mosquito net. 
