From the Pastor

Easter is the amazing result of Holy Week. We will wave our Palms and sing on Palm Sunday and then we will make a quick turn. 
"Seeds of Hope" Food Pantry.

First Presbyterian Church maintains a wellstocked food pantry. We provide nutritional food

and food products to those individuals and families, living in the region around the church. The pantry is a partnership of New Hartford First Methodist, New Hartford Presbyterian, Our Saviour Lutheran and Utica First Presbyterian Churches and is located in First Presbyterian Church at 1605 Genesee St. The pantry is open on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9:30 to 11:30 am.

VOLUNTEER OPPORTUNITIES--SEEDS OF HOPE FOOD PANTRY—

- 1. GUIDING and/or COORDINATING NUMBERS AND BREAD TABLE ON PANTRY DAYS: We are open Tuesday and Thursday mornings from 9:30 to 11:30 except for Thanksgiving week and on days that the Utica schools are closed due to weather. We need 4 to 6 people on each pantry day for 2.5 to 3 hours. Interested people should give their contact information to The Coordinator of Volunteers (Sonya Linakis) or to a coordinator in their home church (if your church does it that way). Assignments are made as needed or on a rotating basis. Need to arrive by 9:20 AM in time to get the guiding information you'll needed for consistent operation that day.
- 2. <u>CLIENT CHECK IN ON PANTRY DAYS:</u> Same general 2.5 to 3 hour requirements as above but these people perform the entry interview of each Head of Household who visits that day. This requires a good and friendly spirit and the asking of specific questioning and noting of the answers given. Volunteers are coordinated the same as above and we prefer to have at least 3 people registering each pantry day.
- 3. <u>STOCKERS & CLIENT HELPERS ON PANTRY DAYS</u>: Two or three people are needed to oversee the supply of food on the serving shelves and to help load clients' cars or carts as they exit. These folks also need to be ready to clean up spills and to provide help where needed.
- 4. TRUCK UNLOADERS ON ALTERNATE MONDAYS: FBCNY trucks deliver food orders on (roughly) alternate Mondays at a time between 8:00 AM and 3:00 PM. We usually get our scheduled time the prior Friday or Saturday and call you. We need between 4 and 6 helpers each time depending upon the size of the delivery. The volunteers are coordinated by the Coordinator of Purchasing (Bill Wescott).
- 5. OUTBACK STEAKHOUSE COLLECTOR ON MONDAYS: Pick up surplus frozen food at the New Hartford store between about 11:15 AM each Monday and brings it to the pantry for storage in our freezers. Logistics of getting into the church and the pantry need to be arranged EACH TIME. An electronic report on the amount received needs to be filed within a day or two. (Bill Wescott and Bill Pfeiffer can do this.)
- 6. PANERA BREAD COLLECTIO ON TUESDAY NIGHT & WEDNESDAY AM: One or two people pick up surplus baked goods from the New Hartford store at 10 PM EACH TUESDAY NIGHT and takes it home, leaving it in the car. The product is delivered to Seeds of Hope about 9 AM on Wednesday for repackaging (with additional helpers) for Thursday's Pantry Day. It is a big help (but not vital) for the person(s) picking up can also help repackage the goods. This takes from 1 to 2 hours on Wednesday morning...many hands make light work.
- 7. PRICE CHOPPER BAKED GOODS COLLECTOR: These people picks up surplus baked goods from the Price Chopper in North Utica on Monday and Wednesday mornings by 9:15 AM and delivers this food to Seeds of Hope as soon as possible. A form is signed at Price Chopper each day. Logistics of getting into the church and pantry need to be arranged EACH TIME.
- 8. PRICE CHOPPER FROZEN MEAT and DAIRY/DELI SURPLUS COLLECTORS ON MONDAY AND FRIDAY: Coordinated by FBCNY through FEDING AMERICA, two or three people pick up this food at 9:30 AM each Monday and Friday at the nearby Price Chopper on Genesee St. and deliver it immediately to Seeds of Hope. The food is weighed, placed in our freezers and refrigerators, and a form is filled out and faxed to FBCNY.

Easter Fun Day Volunteers Needed

Organizer

Arrange donations of hardboiled eggs, candy and small toys to put in plastic eggs,

Work with other leaders to arrange the schedule and keep students moving from activity to activity.

Assist the children and leaders as necessary.

Plan/lead egg coloring

Bring materials needed (egg dye, vinegar, crayons, stickers, etc.)

You can use mugs from the church kitchen to mix the dye

In the past we have used cookie cooling racks for drying the eggs.

In past years, eggs have been put out at church on Easter morning. After church, eggs are brought home by those who brought them if wanted and by others.

Tell the Easter story

Choose how you would like to tell the story. Possibilities include, but are not limited to, reading a picture book, showing a video – you can find some on youtube, telling the story with pictures found online – one site you can check is teachers pay teachers.

Share your plan with Pastor Anita.

Share the story with the children on April 20th.

Plan and lead the children in decorating the sanctuary windows.

With Pastor Anita, decide on a project. There are many ideas online.

Gather needed materials and prepare items as needed.

Lead and assist children with project on April 20th

Plan/lead the Easter egg hunt

Fill plastic eggs with treats and toys donated (we have many plastic eggs at the church)

Hide eggs

Give children instructions for hunting. Sometimes we have sent children by age to different areas. Other times we have set the eggs up so that similar treats are in the same colored egg and everyone is told to get one of each color. There are many ways to run this. It's up to you to set this up so that all children can be a part.

Plan/lead cookie or cupcake station

bake or have others bake cupcakes or sugar cookies
bring frosting and other decorations
supervise decorating
children can each eat one and the rest can be used for coffee hour on
Easter

Spiritual and religious

Is "Lutheran spirituality" an oxymoron? When we consider Martin Luther and the early reformers, we think of great theologians, prolific writers and musicians. We are well aware of Luther's earthy language and direct communication. But spirituality? Luther as mystic?

Not so much. And yet, Luther was a deeply spiritual person who also cared for the spiritual well-being of his parishioners.

Luther was a monk before he was a college professor and reformer. By his own account he out-monked everyone in his monastery. He took his vows seriously. He longed for God. He wrestled with God. He argued with God. Well before he came to an understanding of grace, Luther nevertheless knew that his life was found in God. He was spiritual *and* religious.

"Spirituality" covers a lot of things. Church historian and writer Martin Marty once said: "'Spirituality' is the code word used to convey everything from profound quests to warm tingles between the toes."

As a parish pastor I often heard people declare that they were spiritual and not religious. I was suspicious that this was an excuse for not coming to church, but I now think there is more to it than that. We are created to search for meaning. Mary Jane Haemig, a professor at Luther Seminary, St. Paul, Minn., wrote: "Today people hear many words but long for authentic words and authentic relationships. They ask whether they can trust what they hear and whether they can trust that anyone will hear what they say. This longing for authentic communication is part of the longing for relationship. The church can help people identify that this longing includes a longing for God."

This issue's cover story is about prayer (page 14). Even in an increasingly secular society, prayer in some form is practiced by most Americans. What happens when we pray? Why do we pray? How

should we pray? Is prayer just a lot of words spoken into emptiness? Is prayer efficacious?

Luther wasn't too worried about these questions. He was more concerned that people actually did pray, that they were in communication with God who hears prayer, commands us to pray and gives us the words we need through the Spirit. He could be pretty blunt: "You must learn to call. Do not sit by yourself or lie on a couch, hanging and shaking your head. Do not destroy yourself with your own thoughts by worrying. Do not strive and struggle to free yourself, and do not brood on your wretchedness, suffering and misery. Say to yourself: 'Come on, you lazy bum; down on your knees, and lift your eyes and hands toward heaven!'"

For Luther, God was real, and this real God wants real people to be in real communication with God. We are not to fret about elegant phrases or creative and original prayers. We shouldn't worry about folding hands or raising hands or standing or kneeling. It's not about technique. Prayer is about relationship with God. God has created us for God's self and we are not whole apart from this relationship.

And it is here that this Lutheran began to understand and resist and, finally, imperfectly come to know and trust God more deeply. There is a little stubbornness in me. I like to be in charge. I want to set the terms of engagement. I will decide when God can come in. But here is the wuth: God is already and always present.


Luther wrote: "The entire divine nature is wholly and entirely in all creatures, more deeply, more inwardly, more present than the creature is to itself." That kind of makes resistance pointless.

Prayer is an invitation into divine love. Prayer is God seeking us. In God's seeking, in God's speaking and listening we find ourselves.

Our Community Outreach


Members of Our Saviour live among God's faithful people, serve all people, and strive for justice and peace in all the earth by sharing our building and supporting these programs:
